From the Secretary's Desk

Sitting at my desk in the fifth week of 'Lockdown 3,' I'm trying to summon some optimism for the year ahead as we watch the national race between infection and injection. Given the age profile of Society membership I imagine that many of you will, by now, have received your first vaccination and will be feeling more hopeful about the chances of a return to normal life.

Although our 2020 programme of events was completely lost, the year was not without some

positives. The revised Shropshire Trail seems to have been well received by members and I hope that before long we can resume its wider distribution. Meanwhile the story of the Semple letters donation, revealed in the last Newsletter, moved to its next chapter in early September. Chairman, Peter Waine and I, with Linda Hart in support as photographer, travelled to Cambridge for a low-key, covid-sensitive handover ceremony at Trinity College. Amidst the splendid surroundings of the Wren Library, Peter can be seen here with librarian Dr Nicolas Bell as the cache of thirty letters was passed into the care of the College where they were written between 1925 and 1936. Our hope is that more members will have the chance to examine the letters at some future event at Trinity. Many of you will by now have read the commentary by Dr Christopher Stray in the latest Society Journal. We are enormously grateful to Robert Semple for donating his grandfather's correspondence which has shed new light on AEH's complex personality.

A second positive to report is progress with the centenary edition of *Last Poems*, also announced in September and scheduled for publication in the spring of 2022. Sir Andrew Motion's Foreword is in place, as is the reflective Introduction by Edgar Vincent, who so very sadly died in November, just a few weeks after completing the text. A tribute to Edgar appears elsewhere in this issue. Work continues on the Commentary section being prepared by John Cartwright, and the project Steering Group are confident that, notwithstanding covid difficulties, this very special publication will be on sale in time for the 2022 Ludlow Commemoration.

In the more immediate future, we are hopeful that at least some of the events planned for the coming year and trailed in the last issue will be able to go ahead. The latest indications from government are that restrictions may begin to ease by early May. There seems no option other than to cancel the Birthday Commemoration on March 26th though, if small outdoor gatherings are permitted by then, one or two of us living near Bromsgrove might meet up next to the statue and read a few verses. There is a slightly greater chance that the AGM in Ludlow on April 30th might go ahead in some form and if this is not possible I plan, with my brother, to mount a virtual alternative by recourse to Zoom. To help make this possible the Treasurer's Annual Report and Accounts are printed within this issue for reference by those able to join in. We would aim to follow the brief business session with our presentation "The Brothers Housman".

All of this uncertainty makes it more important than ever that we are able to make contact with members by email. In spite of repeated efforts on my part many of our longer-standing members have not provided this information, and in some other cases recent emails have bounced back – presumably because of failure to notify changes. So yet another appeal from your Secretary: will members please take just a few minutes to convey or confirm email addresses to me using <u>maxhunt468@gmail.com</u> In this way you can be assured of up-to-date information about the current year's programme as the covid situation evolves.

There can be more confidence that things might be back to some sort of normality by mid-summer. The Evesham Festival of Words organisers have now published their programme with a slight change of date for the main weekend at the beginning of July (See Forthcoming Events). We look forward to welcoming Peter Parker to deliver the Housman Lecture in All Saints Church on Saturday July 3rd. A little later in the month we hope to run the summer visit to Lyme Regis as originally planned for last year, and we hope members will be able to renew their accommodation bookings for July 13/14th. Beyond that we are still giving thought to the possibility of a Cambridge event in October with opportunity to inspect the Semple letters. We will try and keep up to date information on the website as well as making direct contact where we have your email addresses.

Even while we are locked down surprises still occur. Just the other day a copy of the 2020 Journal dropped through the Secretarial letter box, having been returned as undelivered all the way back from New York City! A quick check confirmed that the mailing address for this longstanding member, a senior American classicist, had been clearly rendered by the printer's despatch clerk. Records also showed timely subscription payment for the current year, so no indication of changed circumstances. Anxious that our American professor be not denied the benefit of Chris Stray's commentary on the Semple letters, I was pondering options when ex-New Yorker Linda Hart sprang to my assistance with her local knowledge of the Bronx. In no time at all she was chatting on the phone to Professor David Sider whose immediate response was "Trump"!

Apparently our American cousins had been experiencing chaos in their postal service as a result of the politically motivated changes inflicted by the now ex-President. The story was one of holiday forwarding arrangements being lost or ignored and hence the "return to sender". Prof. Sider's Journal is now on its way back to New York and will, I imagine, hold some sort of record as the most travelled copy in the history of the Housman Society!

I wish all members a steadily improving year and repeat my plea to receive current email addresses.

Edgar Vincent 1933-2020



We were much saddened to learn early in December of the death of long-time Society member, Edgar Vincent, at the age of 87. His acclaimed biography *A.E.Housman: Hero of the Hidden Life* was published by Boydell & Brewer in 2018. In a full-length, 500-page work, Edgar drew on published letters as well as new material to conjure an image of Housman which wove together his scholarly life with biographical elements found in his poetry. In so doing, he examined Housman's often hidden feelings with dispassion and objectivity.

Reviewing the book for the Society's 2018 Journal, Andrew Maund noted that while it is "an engaging and easy read from first to last partly because it wears its scholarship so lightly, of its academic weight and rigour there can be no doubt." Reflecting on the evident "pain and injustice so keenly felt" by Housman, Andrew concluded that "Edgar Vincent throws the full light of understanding onto that life in a carefully crafted, rigorously scholarly, and thoroughly engaging biography."

Edgar Vincent read English at St Catherine's College, Oxford, in the 1950s before taking up a commission in the Royal Navy. His subsequent career was with Imperial Chemical Industries where he worked for thirty years, rising to become Group Personnel Manager. Shortly after retiring he began work on his much-praised *Nelson: Love and Fame*, an award-winning book published by Yale University Press in 2003.

In the last months of his life Edgar wrote the Introduction for the Society's forthcoming Centenary Edition of *Last Poems*, which is scheduled for publication in the spring of 2021. This, the last piece of writing he did, will stand as a fitting memorial to a noted Housman biographer.

Housman Society Book Exchange Sale

As I write these few introductory words for the newsletter I calculate that this is the nineteenth year of the Book Exchange and it is interesting to note how much has changed over that period. The second-hand bookshop has all but disappeared from our streets and browsing old titles within those little shops has been replaced by surfing the internet on a variety of electronic contraptions in a myriad of locations. And the result of the relentless march of the internet on book prices has been simple – it has made the price of ordinary books much cheaper and the price of special books much more expensive. I recall buying a copy of the American edition of More Poems back in the 1980's in Ludlow and paying $\pounds 42$ – that's probably about £100 in today's money – for a book which I could now easily pick up for a ten-pound note. On the other hand, if you search the internet and locate the only copy of a book advertised on the web then that seller can ask virtually what he will for the buyers will be beating a path to his inbox.

Likewise, at the Book Exchange I can report that the 'Stop Press' items in last September's Newsletter - the funeral notices for AEH and the virtually unobtainable copies of 'Three Poems' and Gow's *Adversaria* – sold out in hours, while the bulk of the other advertised material made little impact on purchasers; but you will recall that I admitted that I was advertising 'old stock', as the covid problems had denied the Book Exchange the opportunity to obtain new material. As covid has not relented since then, and rather than reprint the same listing, I have decided to announce the first Housman Society Book Exchange Sale. Roll up! Roll up! Now, I have mentioned over the years that the Society has a large stock of modestly priced volumes which have been largely ignored by the membership and so in the following listing everything is now priced at £5 or £10. It will be noted that the books offered are not Collectors' Copies, but everything listed is properly described and much of this stock has been reduced by between 25% and 50% from previous advertised prices in the hope of making them more attractive to a purchaser. In Section Two the unsold Association Copies that have been previously advertised are reduced to a giveaway £10 each.

Contains the first appearance of seven of Housman's comic verses. Staples rusted as usual, the pages which are somewhat dog-eared and contain a pencilled limitation statement by NVH Symons.
